WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH. From the Rector:

As we move closer to Summer, with much anticipation of warmer weather and sunny skies, many are already making plans as to how they are going to spend this time. Students of course, are eager to complete yet another school year, some are already excited by upcoming grade 12 graduations and, college or university convocations. Teachers are excited to have a much, deserved break from the classroom, to recharge their batteries to take on a new school year. Parents are planning all kinds of summer activities to keep the children busy and entertained, including some travel to vacation places. Some are excited to just drive a few kilometers to relax at the cabin, cottage or trailer. Whatever you are planning to do this summer, some of it is centred around rest, relaxation and the renewal of mind, body and spirit. We cannot overstate the importance of time spent for recreation or "re-creation", without it we cannot function to our fullest potential. During the months of July and August, we also have a little down-time even in the church, as our many committee members, and volunteers, take a little break from the rigours of parish life. It's been an extremely difficult few years for everyone, with a three - year pandemic that we have all fought through, and the challenges of getting back to the routine of our lives, pre-pandemic, in the work place, in our schools, in our families, and in our church. We are getting there, and our lives are nearly back to normal. Here in the parish, over the past few months, we have gotten our Sunday School up and going again, and still a need to get those numbers of children and teachers up, we have gotten back to doing many of the activities that were halted for three years both fundraising and building church community again, we have seen some parishioners returning that we haven't seen for awhile, we have seen some new people come and make this parish their worshipping community, and some other signs of new life. Like the time it takes us to exit this long, cold Spring, into the promises of new life that we look forward to every summer, we see subtle signs of new life being breathed into our church, and we give God thanks for the hope we have, as we dream new possibilities and work to make them a reality. The purpose of any church is not self-preservation, but rather dreaming a better world, a more united world, a more peaceful world, a world where everyone, regardless of race, gender or status, are afforded the basic human dignities that come from being a child of God. We must dream, but

making dreams into reality is really where the rubber hits the road, so to speak. Over recent years, even decades, we have seen a somewhat divided church, a broken church really, over issues such as remarriage of divorced people, ordination of women, blessing and marriage of same gender couples, atrocities committed in residential schools, and other crimes against indigenous peoples. These are some issues, but there are many others as well, and while we don't minimize the importance of all these things, as these conversations, painful as they are, needed to take place, in some cases they did not serve to draw us closer together as the body of Christ, but further divided us, and weakened our universal call to live the gospel in the wider world. I believe God calls us to something greater than that. Once we acknowledge our brokenness, hear all the voices in the room, and accept the command of Christ to, in the words of the BCP Communion service, love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength. This is the first and great commandment, and the second is like unto it: Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets. (Mark 12) Even in matters of disagreement we are called to love, and the greater sin of the church, no matter what the topic might be, is that many times love dissipates into anger, retaliation, and even hatred. If Christian love, in its purest form is allowed to exist in all our conversations, and we hold it before us, and we pray for it, and we are open to the moving of the Holy Spirit among us, and we loosen that grip on self-preservation, I am convinced that we would have a more unified church, and, if we allow that same concept to permeate among nations, we would have a more peaceful world.

I have no doubt that as long as the world remains, as long as churches remain, as long as humanity remains, we will face many challenges toward human dignity, unity and global peace and stability. I just wish we could approach it with hearts of love, knowing that the single word Jesus used, more than anything else was "love". If we can hold before us his call to love one another, I think we can achieve much more than we have achieved so far in the church and in the world. My prayer, as we move forward as a parish in this place, is that we will call to remembrance always the call of our Lord to love one another, as he has loved us; and, that others will know us because of our love. I believe enough damage has been done to the body of Christ, and now is a time for rebuilding our lives and churches into the image of Christ.

Now that our choir is up and going again we would love to welcome new members of all ages. It would be wonderful if we could have enough members to fill out the choir pews on both sides of the chancel. In addition to singing to the glory of God on Sunday morning it is also a time of fellowship and fun each week at practice.

All individuals, church and non-church groups are reminded that the Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre and washrooms are not to be accessed until the after-school Ballicatter group concludes at 6:00 pm Monday to Friday and all children are picked up. This is in accordance with provincial rules that govern the Ballicatter operation. If access to the kitchen is required, please check with Michelle first. Anyone using the facility during the time the program is operating must have a code of conduct letter on file at the parish office, as well as permission from Michelle, the Ballicatter program administer.

**Sunday School is up and going** and we encourage parents with young children to bring them to the 10:30 am Sunday service so they can be a part of it. If we have adequate numbers of children we can plan some congregational activities as well. We also encourage others to volunteer as helpers.

Parish is calling for quotes to re-shingle the roof. In the past year we have had some shingles blow off and in a couple of places we have leaks. At this time, we are looking to get some quotes to give us an idea of what it would cost to replace the shingles (now about 22 years old). Once we have the quotes we will determine if it's something we are

able to proceed with in the very near future. If you know of reputable roofing companies, please encourage them to consider giving us their quote.

We will soon start our lighting project. Over the last couple of years, we have replaced most of the lighting in the building with more energy efficient LED ones, except for the main area of the church. This was done at a very low cost to the parish, and we have reduced our carbon footprint. The big job remaining is to remove all the existing lighting in the nave, chancel and sanctuary areas and replace with better lighting, burning less electricity. We are awaiting diocesan approval, and expect to complete this job over the coming months. The cost to achieve this work will be around \$40,000 (tax included) We invite members of the parish to consider financial support. Perhaps a family might consider donating the cost of a light? Total number of new lights will be 36 at an average cost of approximately \$1150. Once this project is complete, we will be a good example of a church building and parish going greener, and being better stewards of the environment. We will have done this not only by the lighting, but also by our Geo-Thermal heating system and our recycling program. Again, we call on the generosity of our parishioners to help out.

#### Bishop has authorized the return of the Common Cup.

For three years we have been receiving Eucharist in one kind only (bread), because of safety concerns during the pandemic. As of Sunday, May 28th (Pentecost Sunday), parishes in the diocese, including here at St. Philip's, will once more provide the chalice for those who wish to receive from it. This comes from medical reassurance that it is once more, safe to do so. However, we realize that many people will still be uncomfortable receiving from the cup, and that is perfectly fine, and to continue to receive the bread only is also fine. Prior to the pandemic some people received the wine through intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), the bishop has advised that this practice is not to be used in the diocese, because of a greater concern of fingers inadvertently coming into contact with the wine. So, as of May 28th, we can do a couple of things: (1) Receive the bread and drink from the chalice or (2) continue to receive in one kind only (bread). The choice is entirely yours and the validity of the sacrament is real for each one.

Maintenance Fund: We continue to ask our parishioners to give monthly through the Maintenance Fund to help us lower our debt on the heating system. We borrowed the amount of \$50,000.00 from the Bank of Montreal. This loan, we are happy to say will be completely paid off this coming November. Following that we will need to keep paying into our maintenance fund on a regular basis because within the next couple of years we will probably need to replace the roof shingles, among other necessary jobs to be done. Your support of the Maintenance Fund is extremely important to the parish.

Columbarium niches are still available for purchase. Approximately 31 of the 48 available have been sold since they were first installed in 2016. The cost is still \$3000 (no tax if purchased from the church, funeral home will charge tax) The plan is to install more of them once these are sold, however, the cost of future units will be determined by the cost of purchase and installation at that time. Anyone requiring more information about the columbarium is asked to speak to the rector.

As we draw closer to Summer, and as our parishioners think about travel, spending time away at the cottage, etc. please know that we appreciate it when we can keep up with our monthly financial commitments as a parish, which takes the pressure off our parish treasurer. We encourage the use of post-dated contributions, and especially signing up for E-Giving. Quite a few of our parishioners are already giving regularly electronically, if this is something you would like to do, please pick up the proper form from the parish office. We are also set-up for E-Transfer giving by using parish email: stphilipsanglicanchurch@nf.aibn.com Regular contributions throughout the Summer really helps us stay on top of our bills, stipend, synod office assessment, etc. and makes it easier when things start up again in September.
