From the Rector's desk: As I write today (June 29th) we are approaching the Canada Day celebrations, a time for us to reflect on all that is good about our nation. There are many who chose to dwell on what is negative, which, unfortunately, overshadows our gratitude for all the blessings we enjoy as Canadians. Of course, we don't live in a perfect nation, for such a place does not exist on earth, we pay way too much in taxes, we have some degree of political corruption, we have families that live in abject poverty, individuals that live on the streets, families that rely on food banks to get by each month, seniors that choose between buying medications, eating healthy, or heating their homes, our national healthcare system facing the biggest challenge since the beginning of universal healthcare in 1959, with a shortage of doctors, nurses and other medical professionals. This list can go on and on, and I'm sure you add your own examples of what is wrong with our nation to it. If we spend all our time focusing on the things that are wrong, then we miss out on the joy of celebrating all the good things about life in Canada. That is really the meaning of Canada Day, to really express why we are proud to be Canadian. It might even be a day to disconnect from social media, to give ourselves a break from the flying arrows of negativity that seems to dominate these mediums.

With all that we can find undesirable about our nation, we can find much more to celebrate. Many legion groups across our province, on July 1st, will carry out commemorative ceremonies to honor the sacrifice of Newfoundland soldiers in 1916. The Battle of Beaumont-Hamel was a part of the Battle of the Somme in World Ware One. It took place on

July 1, 1916, when the British and Newfoundland forces attacked the German lines near the village of Beaumont-Hamel in northern France. The attack was a disaster for the British and Newfoundland troops, who suffered heavy casualties from the German machine guns and artillery. The 1st Newfoundland Regiment was almost wiped out in the battle. Their sacrifice is perhaps one of the greatest examples of why we are thankful to be Canadian. One of the marks of being citizens of this nation is our gratitude for freedom and democracy, and our unwavering desire to preserve it at all costs. The freedom we have in Canada, as well as much of the freeworld came at a very high cost to millions who gave their lives for it in WW1, WW2, Korea, Vietnam, Korea, Iraq and Afghanistan, to name a few of the major conflicts in the last century. So, as we put out our flags, decorate our yards in red and white, and proudly declare our love for Canada, let us do with a sense of pride and thankfulness, for many gave a lot to make this possible. Over the next couple of months of summer, my prayer is that you and your family will have a very safe and happy summer, doing all the fun things that come with the season. Each Sunday our church doors will be open at 8:30 am and 10:30 am to welcome parishioners and visitors to worship, for our worship too is an expression of gratitude to God for all the good things we enjoy about freedom. It is perhaps hard for us to comprehend that there are still places in our world where people are not free to gather for public worship, where it is illegal to express Christian faith, and those who dare to do so face persecution and imprisonment. When we gather on a Sunday morning, we must be grateful for the right to do so. As we live out, and express our faith, we are ever mindful of Jesus' sacrifice that makes this possible. God gives us so much because Jesus did so much to make us worthy. That is at the very heart of the Eucharist – our joy and thanksgiving for what Jesus gave for us. Let us be ever mindful and grateful to God for this grace.

If you have church envelopes to drop off to the church during the week, and the office is not open, please drop them into the box next to the nursery room door. This box will be checked at the end of each day and any envelopes inside will be transferred to the office safe until monies are counted on Sundays.

St. Philip's parish is set up to receive E-Transfers. These days many of us do online banking and send e-transfers, so this is another way to make your contribution to the parish.. The parish will receive your offering instantly and a message will be sent to our treasurer and she will ensure the amount gets added to your envelope offerings for tax purposes. It's very easy and convenient. As we move toward the Summer Season, please remember the needs of the church. Summer is a time when many parishioners are away on holidays, camping, spending time at the cottage, etc. There are several ways that we can still be regular in our weekly offerings, so that the treasurer is able to keep all our commitments up-todate. We have many signed up for regular E-Givings, if this is something you would like to do, simply pick up a form from the parish office. We can keep post-dated cheques in the office safe, and we can use the Email Transfer method, by simply using the parish email: stphilipsanglicanchurch@nf.aibn.com You may simply type the message "weekly offering" in the message box. Thank you for all your generous support to the parish, it helps us stay financially strong and viable. This is especially important at a time when some parishes are struggling to stay afloat and joining up with other parishes to share a priest.

NOTICES / MEMORABLE DATES

July 23 - The 2023 Annual Flower Service will be on Sunday, July 23rd at 3:00 pm. We want to give everyone lots of advance notice, as some people living away may schedule their visit home around the time of the service.

We are now receiving names for the 2024 Confirmation class. If you have a child that you would like to have enrolled in Confirmation class later this Fall, please speak to Rev. Randy. The child should be, or will be age 11 by the time the bishop comes for the service (no date set yet but probably in Spring).

More help is needed with the ACM recycling program. Did you know that over the many years our ACM has been collecting recyclables they have brought over \$250,000 into the parish? Each week the recyclables are picked up from designated drop off bins in town, taken to the sorting and counting location, and counted and bagged on Monday nights. Once there is enough collected, they are taken to the recycling depot in St. John's There is a need for more help in doing this work. If you would like to be part of this very important work, and can spare a couple of hours on Monday nights, please speak to Gary King or John Parrell.

A Summer student has been hired. Once again, we received a government grant to hire a student for 8 weeks. The job was advertised and we did receive a small number of applications, each one was interviewed, and we wish we could hire them all. It was agreed to hire Kaiden Snow, you will remember him from last Summer, he did an excellent job before and is excited to be with us again this year. Much of his work will be in the cemetery, getting everything looking good in preparation for our annual Flower Service on July 23rd.

The Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre is now available for rentals. If you would like to book the hall, or would like information about rental costs, please contact Donna or Janice Spurrell at 895-3581. Because of costs, earlier this year Vestry made a slight increase to rental rates. It was a very minimal increase and the facility is still the least costly venue in the town.

A few of the new lights have been donated but there is still opportunity for others to be donated. The cost of a light purchased and installed is approximately \$1150 and can be donated in memory of loved ones. This project is expected to be started within the next few days. At a later time, we will dedicate the lights given as memorial gifts.

We will be re-shingling the church roof soon. In the past year we have noticed that each time we have strong wind we lose a few shingles. We have determined that the life of the shingles have now expired and the problem will only get worst over the near future. We also want to avoid the damage that comes from water leaking through the roof. We were hoping to do this work another year, especially doing the lighting project this year, however, it is necessary to get it done now. Vestry received a number of bids on the work, and they did range in price vastly; we decided to accept a bid from Metro Roofing of \$56,850.00 plus HST for a total of \$65,377.50 We will receive half the HST back (4,263.75) and we will receive a rebate from our diocesan account (2,500). Once we receive these rebates the cost of doing the roof will be approximately \$58,613.75. We ask all our parishioners to support the ongoing work of maintaining our building, by regularly contributing above and beyond our regular offerings, to the Maintenance Fund.

Columbarium niches are still available for purchase. Approximately 36 of the 48 available have been sold since they were first installed in 2016. The cost is still \$3000 (no tax if purchased from the church, funeral home will charge tax) The plan is to install more of them once these are sold, however, the cost of future units will be determined by the cost of purchase and installation at that time. Anyone requiring more information about the columbarium is asked to speak to the rector.

Summer bulletins will be printed once a month for July and August. Over the summer most of the regular activities in the parish are recessed and there is not as much information to share. The bulletin for each of these two months will include all the services for the month, with collects, prayers, readings and readers for each Sunday.

Please keep our bishop and delegates in prayer as they represent us at the 43rd General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada, taking place in Calgary June 27th – July 2nd. This coincides with the national Convention of The Evangelical Lutheran Church In Canada, also meeting in Calgary. We are in full communion with the Evangelical Lutheran church, and some of the sessions will be held jointly. The focus of the General Synod gathering will be on diversity and transformation. We pray for the guidance and moving of the Holy Spirit on the bishops and lay people assembled from all over Canada.

Anglican Charitable Foundation For Children is a tri-diocesan fund in existence for many years, and is available to help families in need of assistance. If you know of a family that could avail of this assistance and meet the criteria, please let the rector know. This fund is also available to children that would like to attend the Church Camp this summer at Max Simm's Camp in the Central diocese. Those who qualify may be able to have their camp fees paid. As well, later when school reopens there may be families in difficult financial positions that could use assistance in getting the children ready for school again.
