From the Rector's desk: As I reflect on this writing, I find myself two days away from the end of my three week holidays, and in Grand Falls Windsor, where my family and I continue to pray that our house there will be sold before the time to enrol two of our sons at MUN, and the other to grade 11. So, while it has been good to be with the family, it has not been the greatest of holidays, as we remain in a constant state of anxiety as the house remains on the market, and, as we wonder about our living arrangements in September as a family. We continue to have hope that a buyer will come onto the scene in time, so we will see how all of that works out. I have also been following the news of the world, and, more especially of our own nation. Like so many of you, I was so deeply grieved by the shooting rampage in Danforth, Toronto, this past week (July 22), that saw an 18year old girl and a 10year old girl killed, and, 13 others of various ages severely wounded, as well as the 29year old gunman killed. As police investigate the matter I'm sure many more details about the shooter and the incident will be known. Another senseless act of gun violence in our nation, another wave of grief that comes over us collectively as a nation, another reminder that any of our lives can

change upside down at any time. I think of those two young girls killed, the oldest celebrating her 18th birthday, and preparing to pursue a career in nursing this Fall at university, the youngest at 10 out with family and/or friends, with not a worry in the world, filled with joy and excitement as anyone at that age would be, and parents with no reason to worry about them at all in a place not normally known for this kind of violence. When we see and feel the pain of those families that must bury their children now, and those visiting their loved ones in hospital praying for their recovery, our own worries and anxieties don't seem to match up. Our prayer is for those families grieving and for the recovery of the injured. Though these kinds of things cast a dark shadow over society, we must still find ways to keep hope alive. Perhaps the greatest reason for hope is the light that shines in the darkness, the light of Christ. This light shines brighter when we see the human compassion and love of others that brings healing. It is wonderful to know that in these dark times and events an entire nation can be moved to help and comfort the grieving and the injured. That's what we call "*Community*", and we need it so much in our lives. Let us thank God for the community we share, as a church, a town, a province and a country, knowing we are loved and cared for by so many.
