From the Rector's desk:

As we approach the half-way point of 2020, what a year it's been thus far. When we consider the week long shut-down in January because of weather, which also saw the closing of our churches, and now more than three complete months of closure because of the Covid-19 pandemic, we are still left to wonder when and how it will all end. It is accurate to say that practically no living human can remember such a time in their lives, and, we hope when this is over we will not see it again for the rest of our lives. Not only are we facing the implications of this pandemic in terms of people getting sick, many dying, loss of employment, global economic devastation, closure of schools, churches and practically every other public service, but we are also seeing other things rising to the surface that cause us much concern. As I mentioned in my reflection last Sunday (June 21st), this pandemic has brought out both the best and the worst of humanity. We are aware of many pandemic stories where we have rallied to aid and support one another, where even strangers are moved with love and compassion to help others in need, I'm sure you have been a blessing to someone even in your own small circles. At the same time we have seen an increase in hatred and violence toward others in society, simply because of their skin color or ethnicity. We have seen this full scale in the USA with the unjustified killings of several black people by police, and, sadly we have also seen it several times in the past few months in Canada. It was reported this week, by the CBC that, from a survey of 500 Chinese Canadians half of them reported being called names or insulted because of Covid-19. 43% said they have been threatened or intimidated, and, 61% said they have adjusted their daily routines so as to avoid run-ins or unpleasant encounters. This unjustified behavior stems from an ignorant belief that if you are Chinese than

years, and, in supposedly progressive and advanced societies such as in Canada and the USA, and so many other countries, that we are still having conversations about racial equality, and, that there is still a need to protest for basic human rights. Scripture reminds us that Jesus died "once and for all", he never once treated anyone he encountered differently because of the color of their skin or their socio-economic status. In the gospel for this Sunday (June 28th) Jesus says "*whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me...whoever gives a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple will not lose their reward*". Clearly we have a lot of work to do yet before we attain to the goals that Jesus set for his followers. We hope and pray that as the evil of racism is front and centre in our world at the present time there will be a greater understanding of what Jesus meant when he said "*The Lord our God is one Lord; and thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it: Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets.*" For the Christian there ought to be no confusion, there ought to be no conversation necessary about racism, Jesus says it plainly – Love all people! The "Church" has the unique position in society to be a voice for those who are victims of racism, bigotry and oppression. Indeed, to go a step further, the church has a God-given responsibility and obligation to do so. It is true that over the last number of decades the voice of the church has not carried the same sense of authority as it once did, however, the command of Jesus to go into all the world to preach the gospel has not changed. We must call out evil in whatever form we encounter it, to sit passively by is not an option, and, to do so is to neglect our calling to be the people of God. As we emerge from this pandemic I hope we do so with a greater sense of what God expects from us as individual Christians, and, together collectively as the Church, and dedicate

We received a grant from the Anglican Foundation to help with the plans we have for the cemetery space around the columbaria. When we start and complete these beautifications will depend on the lifting of restrictions around Covid-19. We honor our high school graduates. This has been a difficult year for teachers, students and parents. We are especially sorry that the grade 12 graduates did not get to have the traditional graduation ceremonies and celebrations that they have been looking forward to for several years. From St. Philip's parish – congratulations on your achievement, and best wishes for a bright future ahead of you!

you are responsible for Covid-19. Most of these Chinese Canadians were born here and are no more responsible for the Corona virus than you or I. I ask us all to look at our own lives and see what we can do to be true to the promises of our baptism, and, shine radiantly for the Kingdom of God.
