**From the Rector's desk:** Here we are, once again ready to continue the journey from Lent to Holy Week, from Holy Week to Easter. Holy Week is a very solemn reminder to us of the depth of God's love, that the very Son of God would come into this world in human form, just like us, and give his life as a ransom for us. There are few Christian denominations that place as much emphasis on the birth, life, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus as Anglicanism. A great part of who we are is the importance we place on telling the story of Jesus in scripture and sacrament. We follow a three year liturgical and lectionary calendar designed to teach us the stories of Jesus. We observe special days and seasons of the church year that call us to commemoration and observance. Nothing is more sacred than what we do this week in the life of the Church. We join countless millions of Christians of all denominations in the walk through Holy Week to Easter. It is a walk we take each year, however, in the past couple years of a pandemic, we have gotten a bit off track, especially at times when we were unable to assemble safely. However, even in these challenging times the Church has done everything possible to remind us of the Passion Story – the story of Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, washing of the disciples feet by our Lord, his betrayal by Judas, his arrest in the Garden, mock trial and horrific death on a cross. Sometimes I fear that in the retelling of the story down through the centuries, and more especially in the present age, much of its meaning gets lost. For many they treat it as a fairy tale, and Easter becomes nothing more than a holiday, and the Easter bunny gets far more attention than Jesus. The commercialization of Christian events, such as Christmas and Easter, may be contributing to the lack of religious observance of these most holy days and seasons. I suppose we can't do much about that, it's just the way things are. However, what we do have control over is our own individual response to Easter and other special Christian observances. I venture to say that most of us as Christians get caught up in the secularism of Christmas and Easter. My wife and I still make that trip or two to the mall, or to Walmart to stock up on an abundance of Easter chocolate for our three adult sons. We have been doing that practically from the time they were able to consume the treat. Like Christmas, it's so easy to lose sight of the true meaning of Easter unless we make a conscious effort to capture its essence.

Holy Week is a wonderful reminder to us of what Easter truly is about. It is hard to capture the meaning of Easter unless we start with Palm Sunday. A lot happens in that week leading up to the resurrection. The current state of world affairs can also distract us from the joy of Easter. I am not familiar with any other time in my own lifetime where the world has been so polarized, so politically and militarily charged than today. The past two plus years of

battling Covid-19 globally and locally, being reminded daily of its devastation as people continue to fall ill and some die, has worn most of us down, we long for a day when we are done with it. Then we have the 50 day war, as we see Russian forces under Putin, continue to pound Ukraine, senseless death and destruction, crimes against humanity, it just keeps going and going. These things, and so much more really do rob us of the joy of living wholesome and sacred lives. The story of Easter is one that reminds us that life can come from death, light can shine through darkness and gloom, hope can emerge from fear and despair. Easter shows us that the power of good will always conquer evil. I hope the people of Ukraine, and all of us that stand with them and pray for them, will see that also, that the vast majority of the world condemns the actions of this evil Russian dictator.

I pray this Easter will find you with a newfound sense of optimism and hope for a better world. I hope your faith in the resurrected Lord will sustain you in whatever difficulties and challenges you might be facing at this time. That is the strength of Christian love, we stand with each other, we support each other, we journey together as part of the family of God. World crisis', war and tensions will come to pass, what endures is the glory of the resurrected Christ, who promises that he will never leave us nor forsake us. Whatever you might go through make sure to never go through it alone but depend on the promise he makes. From me, my family, and your church family here at St. Philip's, may you have a blessed Easter, filled with renewed joy, hope and blessings from a God who loves us more than we can imagine – that's the story of Holy Week and Easter.

**Welcome to our Easter celebrations.** We are so pleased to be able to open wide our church doors to welcome both parishioners and visitors to our Easter services. Happy Easter from the Rector, Wardens, Vestry and parish of St. Philip's. May you know the joy of the resurrected Christ, and may the promise of Easter strengthen your faith.

**Help at recycling is needed.** For many years now our men's group (ACM) has been involved in a parish recycling program. We have a trailer where recyclables are carried after they have been picked up from various locations, and a group of parishioners gather most Monday nights to sort and bag them. When enough has been collected then they are taken to the depot and turned into cash that mainly ends up in the parish budget each year. The pandemic has really hampered this work, and some of our men have not been able to get back at it yet. The other reality is that some of our helpers are not as young as they once were when the program was started. We really do need to have extra help on Monday nights in order to be able to continue this vital work, which is a service to our environment and a bonus to our budget. Seven or eight thousand dollars each year comes from this program. If you have time to help out some Monday nights please let our ACM group know or speak to the rector.

The **Ballicatter After-school program** still has openings for children that need this service. The pandemic has made it difficult for them to keep their numbers up, especially when so many parents were working from home. This program has been a tremendous benefit to our parish budget bringing in \$20,000 annually in rent. Please, if you know of any parents needing afterschool care for their children tell them about this great program we have right here in our parish centre.

**Fundraisers and parish hall rentals** continue to be down because of the pandemic. This has created a decline in our overall parish revenues to date. Our regular envelope offerings are up but what we budgeted from other sources are down. We want to stress the importance of all our parishioners helping us to meet our financial obligations as we enter 2022.

**Maintenance envelopes in your box of envelopes** are very important. So far this year we have noted a decrease in maintenance offerings. Your maintenance offering helps to pay our outstanding parish loan (cost of the geothermal heating system) of \$653.93 per month and other items of regular maintenance around the church. We look forward to retiring this outstanding loan in a couple more years and we ask all our parishioners to consider using the maintenance envelope each month.

. **PWRDF is supporting Ukrainians forced to flee their homes** due to the Russian invasion. The initial grant of \$20,000 issued to an ACT Alliance appeal has been increased to \$50,000. The grants will fund the work of Action by Churches Together (ACT) member Hungarian Interchurch Aid (HIA). If you would like to support this effort simply place your donation in a plain envelope, mark it PWRDF Ukrainian Help, with your name and envelope number.

**Thank you to Moses & Linda Tucker** for the gift of Easter flowers that adorn the church for Easter. **Also thank you to others that have contributed to the sanctuary flower fund for Easter.** The money donated to this fund ensures we have fresh flowers adorning the sanctuary not only at Easter but all year long.

**Congratulations to Rev. Randy & Canon Shirley** who will celebrate their 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of ordination as Deacons on April 29th.

**The 98.5 FM frequency is always in use** whenever we are gathered for worship. If our numbers inside exceed the permitted numbers, there is still the ability to listen to the service through your car radio while in the parking lot of the church.

**Would you be interested in volunteering with Sunday School?** Our Sunday school ceased when we entered the pandemic two years ago, however, it is time for us to try to get reestablished again. At the present time we have two volunteers, Jayde Strickland and Luke Fowlow, a young couple who recently moved to the area. Jayde's grandfather (Gordon Jackman) is a member of St. Philip's Parish and Luke is the grandson of Bishop Don Young. If we can get a few more to add to the list we can get going in the new year with restarting Sunday School.

**Thank you to parishioners who contributed to the food bank boxes in the foyer in 2021.** Several times over the past year the food boxes were filled and the food taken to St. Lawrence's Pop-up Pantry, where it was used in food hampers for those in need. We will continue to collect food in the coming year and remind everyone that the food collection boxes will remain in the foyer.

**Sunday School** we also would like to see up and going again. This will require several volunteers to do so. We are now looking for teachers and leaders to help with this. The date we resume will not be known until we have our volunteers in place. This is a vital part of our parish life that got sidetracked during the pandemic, that we hope to get up and going again soon. Please speak to Rev. Randy if you have an interest in getting our Sunday School up and going again.
