From the Rector's desk: We are quickly making our way into 2019, and now Christmas once again seems very far off in our rearview mirror. Today, in our church year Common Lectionary we are at the Second Sunday of Epiphany, and, before we know it we will be preparing for Lent. Isn't that what our lives are like as well? We are constantly in motion, time is rapidly passing, and, before we know it we have passed from one stage of life to the next one. We are children, we become adults, we have families, our children grow, they go out into the world to make their own marks, then we are older and find ourselves wondering where all the time went so quickly. That's simply what we call the cycle of life, and, what's infinitely more important than the passing of time is how we make the best possible use of the time we have. I have known some very old people that have never truly lived because of their attitude to life and to other people, and, I have known some very young people whose lives were short but lived every minute of it with a zest for life and people. The quality of life will always be more important than the quantity, it's about being thankful for what we have and living every day to the fullest. Every day we awaken and can arise to take on that day is a miracle of life in itself. With all the mind-blowing advances of the 21st century there is still a

deep mystery to life that cannot be explained adequately by anyone. We simply don't have the knowledge or the language to properly describe and explain the presence of God in our lives and in our world, and we stand every day in awe of the power of God. God created life, God created this world and humanity simply to bless us with grace and goodness. In the gospel today we find Jesus at a wedding in Cana of Galilee. We don't know who the bride and groom were, only that Jesus, and, his disciples, as well as Mary, his mother were invited to attend. At that wedding the first recorded miracle Jesus did occurs when he changes water into wine, and the finest wine at that. In that day it was a real embarrassment for the family to run out of wine and food at a wedding, likely the case today as well. Jesus instructs them to fill Jars with water, and when it is tasted it has miraculously become the finest tasting wine. People are amazed and some even believe in him. Jesus did this not to be noticed or praised, he did it to reveal his glory as the Son of God. Jesus, just like at a wedding, joins us in the great celebration of life, always there to provide us with what we need to bring joy to our lives. May we live every day giving thanks for the presence and glory of God, and *may we truly live!* (Rev. Randy)

As we begin another year, your rector and vestry are hoping that we will have ended 2018 financially on track as a parish. A financially healthy parish is one that meets at least 80 – 90 percent of its annual budget by free-will givings in the offering plate. Many of the folks that do fundraising in parishes are the ones that are getting older and just don't have the energy to keep up with it. We would like to arrive at a time and place where fundraising activities will be used for outreach ministry more than meeting parish budgets out of necessity.

Bishop Peddle's post-synod pastoral letter

last diocesan synod was *The Future of the*
Church and the Church of the Future, the
bishop's letter will reference that theme, and
how the diocese is now moving forward with
acting on the 29 motions passed. Some
highlights in his letter are the appointment of
a new Mission Archdeacon, the establishing
of a Mission Fund for ministry; the
appointment of a new Cathedral Chapter;

moving beyond the July 2019 General Synod
to make mission ministry the primary focus of
the diocese. Please read the letter in its
entirety as it is very important to understand
the bishop's vision and direction for our
entire diocese. Here is the prayer that
Archdeacon Sam Rose prefaces the letter
with: *Almighty God, the light of the faithful*
and shepherd of souls, who set your servant
Geoffrey to be a bishop in the Church, to feed
your sheep by the word of Christ and to guide
them by good example: give us grace to keep
the faith of the Church and to follow in the
footsteps of Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity
of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.
Amen.

This letter comes from Bishop Peddle on the fifth
anniversary of his consecration as bishop of the
diocese. Please keep him in your prayers as he seeks
to lead our diocese into the future.

Please keep our building secure. We have had no major

that it is the responsibility of that person to safe guard
