Message from the Rector Greetings from your parish of St. Philip's, I trust you are well, and adjusting to cooler temperatures, as we begin to transition ourselves to winter. I have often reflected on the changing of seasons as they correlate to the changing seasons of our own lives, and as we get older, perhaps we reflect more. At the same time, there is an excitement about what lies ahead of us, an anticipation of what God may be leading us to. I hope we don't bemoan the passing of time, but, in a spirit of thanksgiving for blessings of the past, we eagerly look forward to what is to come. The seasons of life are different for everyone because our circumstances of life are different. We are just four weeks away from the beginning of a new liturgical church year, which always begins on the first Sunday of Advent (Nov. 30), and that means we are only about 7 weeks from Christmas. Advent is a time of preparation for Christmas, not commercially but spiritually, though it seems that the commercial emphasis often sidetracks us from spiritual preparation. At this time of year, I always think about the kind of world it was that the people were living in, as they anxiously awaited their messiah. I think about that young couple. Joseph and his very pregnant wife, Mary, as they made the 105 km trip from Nazareth to Bethlehem, perhaps alternately walking and riding a donkey. Joseph originated from Bethlehem, and was a descendent of King David, therefore he was obligated to return "home" to Bethlehem to register in the census. With their mode of transportation, and Mary's condition, it must have taken at least 5 or 6 days to reach their destination. When they arrive in Bethlehem there is no place to stay, others had gotten ahead of them with the influx of people for the census. I'm sure we have all experienced the frustration of arriving in a town or city, perhaps late at night, after driving many hours, only to find there aren't any available hotel rooms, they have all been taken up because of a major event in that town. We can imagine Joseph's frustration, and Mary's concern, as she could give birth anytime. Who knows, the long trip may have caused her to go into labor even earlier than anticipated. Alas, the young child is born, amidst very challenging circumstances. The Savior of the world, the King of kings, the light in the darkness, the long-awaited messiah, had arrived. God, incarnate, was now physically among us in the flesh, as a helpless and vulnerable baby. What caused the birth of Jesus was the sin of the world, people had

moved away from God, forgotten God's promises, broken the covenant relationship, and now the only way to draw them back was for God to take on human form and come among us, what we call the incarnation, God becoming one of us, to save us. We do not know God's present, or future plan for the world, but it does seem that somehow or other we have damaged that covenant relationship again. When we look at the world, the state of our churches, we call to relevance the verse from Isaiah 53: 6 – "All we like sheep have gone astray, we have turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all". In a sense, we have moved away from God again, or simply assume God will fix it without our help, and many question or outright deny the existence of God at all. It is true that the world has never been a perfect place, and likely never will be, after all, it is led by imperfect human beings, some who conscientiously work against God's will and design. The forces of evil and darkness are always at work, but are we fighting against them less vigorously now? I suppose a good question for the church to ponder is -havewe given up the fight for justice, truth and love? Are we content to stay in our corner and ignore the call of Christ to change the world by his word? Advent, is a time for us all, both collectively as the church, and individual Christians, to wrestle with questions such as this, and determine what God may be calling us to do and to be in the world today? One thing is for sure, there is much to be done to right the ship we are on, and to get back on the course Jesus set for us and the Church. After so many centuries, the words of Jesus still ring through - the harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few! Blessings!

A reminder that we still collect non-perishable for items for the local food pantry at St. Lawrence's church. The bins are in the main entrance of our church, and once they are full of food items we bring them to the pop-up pantry at St. Lawrence's. The use of food banks in Canada, and our province is no exception, is increasing at an alarming rate. So far in 2025, there is an average of 15,422 monthly visits to food banks in our province. That's an increase of 8.3% over 2024, and includes an average of 4700 children per month dependent on food banks. Our province has seen a 44.1% increase increase of food bank usage since 2019. We are pleased to be able to support this need and encourage parishioners to help fill our bins.


