From the Rector: : Here we are on the 4th and final Sunday of Advent, a reminder that the time of preparation for Christmas is nearly over, and, whether or not we used the time wisely to prepare ourselves spiritually for the great Christmas celebration is no longer important at this stage. What is important is what do we do now? Advent is the season in which the church casts its gaze to the horizon to catch sight of God's future. Even during times of darkness, difficulty, or despair, Advent teaches us to "remember forward." It reassures us that we can allow our lives today to take the shape of God's tomorrow, living in the full confidence that God's promises will be fulfilled. Along with the season of Christmas and the time between Epiphany and Lent, Advent emphasizes that Jesus Christ is the herald of God's Kingdom. To speak of our Lord in this way, however, is to recognize him as more than a preacher of the Kingdom. After all, the prophets and John the Baptist were also preachers of the Kingdom. To speak of our Lord as the herald of God's Kingdom is to claim that in Jesus the Kingdom is present. As the great missionary bishop, Lesslie Newbigin, once said, "In Christ we are no longer dealing only with the proclamation of the Kingdom; we are also dealing with the presence of the Kingdom." Jesus Christ proclaims and embodies God's kingdom. The readings assigned for the Sundays of Advent are rooted in these understandings. They also challenge us to examine our own lives and our allegiance to the Kingdom of God. The scriptures of Advent, not only pose a challenge, but also offers hope for each of us, for the church, and for the world. As it was for the first Christians, we need to attend to the words of the Old Testament prophets if we are to recognize in Jesus the presence of God's promised Kingdom. So, this year we will look to their words and example to encourage the posture of Advent in our church and in our individual lives. On December 24th we will gather again on the eve of Christmas, to joyfully sing the carols, and to proclaim the joy of the birth of Jesus Christ into the world and into our lives. We are pleased this year, after a three - year absence, to welcome the children back at the 4:00 pm Family Service, to lead us in a Christmas

pageant. For three years we have been impacted by a global pandemic, with restrictions that inhibited our Christmas gathering in the traditional sense. We look forward to a somewhat normal Christmas this year, which will allow us to express our gratitude for the birth of our Saviour in ways that we had always been accustomed to pre-pandemic. May we find that it is also for us the opening of our hearts to make room for him. When he was born into the world it was in a stable, he desires to be born anew in our hearts and lives today. Let's hope and pray that this Christmas we will make the extra effort to ensure there is room there for him. Please join us for our Christmas services this year, and together we will sing the carols, hear the Christmas story, and shout for joy at the birth of Jesus.

Now that our choir is up and going again we would love to welcome new members of all ages. It would be wonderful if we could have enough members to fill out the choir pews on both sides of the chancel. In addition to singing to the glory of God on Sunday morning it is also a time of fellowship and fun each week at practice.

A project to replace all the current lighting in the main part of the church building. Over the last couple of years, we have replaced much of the lighting in the building with less expensive and more efficient LED lighting. We were able to do this easily and at a nominal cost. We realize that much of our electrical costs annually comes from the lights we have in the nave and sanctuary of the church. As we look to the near future, when it is expected that electricity rates will increase significantly, we are looking for ways to reduce our consumption. The Anglican Church of Canada is also emphasizing our need to be ever more conscious of our responsibilities as good stewards of God's creation, and to do whatever we can to reduce our carbon footprint. At the moment vestry is interested in obtaining quotes from qualified electricians so as to get an idea of what the cost will be to transition to new and improved lighting. Once we are ready to proceed with the work, we hope the whole congregation will support the project financially.
