A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH.

From the Rector's desk:

As I reflect today (March 20th) we are just 11 days from Easter. Just recently, a few of us were engaged in a very informal conversation around how Easter was celebrated in the church traditionally, relative to our own culture. We discussed how women and girls would go out and buy themselves a very lovely Easter bonnet (hat), and men and boys would be sure to have a new suit, and everyone would be dressed in their very finest for Easter Sunday, and the church would be full of worshippers. Sometimes, when we look back, we see things the way we want to see them, or through rose-colored glasses so-to-speak. In reality things may not always be the way we remember them. Perhaps the expectations of the day placed a lot of stress on families to conform to traditions. Maybe some families couldn't really afford all these Easter bonnets for the girls, and suits for the boys, especially at a time when it was not uncommon for families to consist of 10 or more children. Maybe Easter expectations placed a financial burden on some families, and for those who couldn't afford to keep up, maybe they didn't come out on Easter morning to worship. Maybe the church also placed too many expectations on people to conform and keep up with traditions, many of which we have happily done away with. There are all kinds of stories in our history of women reduced to tears because they went inside the altar rail without a hat on, or they came to church on Easter morning without a new bonnet, or the children came in tattered clothing. It is true that many people in the church have not always been kind to others, and, we have failed to represent Christ inside church doors. That does not apply to the past only, even today the church often fails to be all that it can be to others. When I say "the church", I mean people who are involved in the life and mission of the church, for we always say – "the church is the people".

So, as we think back to the past, especially as we approach Easter, it's good to reflect on what was good about it, but certainly with the thought that perhaps not everything was done properly. Indeed, some years from now perhaps others will be talking about the good old days of 2024, and

viewing them through those rose-colored glasses.

The one thing that has never changed throughout the ages and generations, is that once we strip away all the humanmade expectations, and traditions, many of which we have already discarded, Easter means the same now as it always did. That it is a celebration of our faith in the risen Christ, it is our hope for eternal life, and it is the very foundation of the Christianity, and it is deserving of our very best offering. It doesn't mean you have to buy fancy, and, expensive clothing, it doesn't mean you have to buy a new bonnet, in order to celebrate. Jesus often spoke about the importance of the heart over the outward appearance, and that sacrifices of animals means nothing. (Matthew 9:13) But go and learn what this means: 'I desire compassion, and not sacrifice,' for I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners." This Sunday (March 24th) we will begin, as we always do, the journey through Holy Week, which will take us from Jesus's entry into Jerusalem on the back of a donkey, to the last supper with his disciples, where he institutes the Eucharist and tells us to do it to remember him, where he washes the feet of his disciples to show us what it means to be a humble servant of him, to his betraval, arrest and crucifixion on Good Friday. To truly celebrate and appreciate the glory of Easter, we must first find ourselves at the foot of the Cross of Good Friday, and it is there that everything in our lives is stripped bear, and we realize that what we thought to be of great significance in our lives, pales in comparison to the sacrifice Jesus made for us.

I invite you to journey with us here at St. Philip's church this Holy Week. The palm crosses are being made for Jesus' triumphal entry this Sunday, we will have worship services on Wednesday, as we use our solemn service of "Tenebrae" (shadows around the cross); on Thursday night as we celebrate Eucharist and remember Jesus' act of humbleness as he washed the feet of others; and Good Friday, as we face the Cross of Jesus. Then I hope you will join us on Easter Sunday, as we celebrate his victory over death by his resurrection. There are no traditions to focus on, there is simply the story of the Cross, and the joy of resurrection, which is where all our hope is grounded. Please consider making worship this Holy Week and Easter a part of your tradition. Have a blessed

As we move along with the rest of the diocese in this program, we hope in this year to engage in some tangible work as a parish to bring about some of these goals.

May 9 - Queen's College Convocation is scheduled for May 9 at the Parish of the Ascension, 58 Smallwood Drive, Mount Pearl. Convocation Speaker for 2024 will be The Most Rev Chris Harper, National Indigenous Archbishop and Presiding Elder of the Sacred Circle. Archbishop Harper has many years of ministry experience among and with Indigenous Anglicans, and a deep passion for the work of reconciliation. Speaking of the role of National Indigenous Archbishop, Harper said it a ministry that is, "More than just to the Indigenous alone; it is a ministry that reaches out to both sides of the Christian conversation, seeking to find paths of healing in the shared legacy we all inherit, seeking to find a common language and identity, wherein we might begin to see and acknowledge each other as equals in the family of God." He sees his role as a balance between offering pastoral healing to Indigenous peoples and communities, especially Residential School Survivors, but also as an advocate for justice and equity for Indigenous peoples with the church and the wider society. He is Plains Cree and a member of the Onion Lake Cree Nation. Born in Paradise Hill, Saskatchewan, Archbishop Harper is the son of a Residential School Survivor. Before his call to ordination, he worked as an emergency medical technician.

<u>July 28</u> - This year's annual Flower Service will be held on Sunday, <u>July 28<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 pm</u>. If the weather does not co-operate the service will be held inside.
