A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH. From the Rector:

Well, it seems that Summer is finally in the air, at the time of reflection today (June 1st) the sun is shining and the temperature has risen a little higher than we have been used to thus far this Spring. I suppose everything is relative, we are longing for hot sunny days, while, at the moment, Nova Scotia and Alberta are praying for cooler wet weather, to help control the fires that are raging and have caused immense destruction of property. Life is never as clear as black and white, not everything is easily defined, because what is good for some is bad for others, what is healthy for some is unhealthy for others, etc. That's the kind of world we live in and these are the lives we live, and what makes life exciting is knowing that God has created such a diverse world and people, and each day brings with it new experiencers of the divine. As much as we know, think we know, and have even proven scientifically, there is so much more to experience, so that even in our life-time we shall never know fully the mind of God, and the mysteries of the universe, or the complexities of life on this one small planet amongst many. So much of God remains, and shall always be, a mystery, and those who proclaim to know fully the mind of God are delusional at best, for God, by definition defies logic and transcends all human comprehension. I think the one thing we need to understand about God, and it is not shrouded in mystery or open to various interpretations, is that God is love. Whatever language we speak, wherever we live, love is universal and is the very heart of God. There is not a more powerful word in scripture, that perfectly describes God than love. Imagine a world where love is embraced as a way of life, and all human interaction is grounded in love. There wouldn't be war, there wouldn't be hunger and homelessness, there wouldn't be loneliness, there wouldn't be oppression and injustice, because we would be taking care of one another in a way that brings the gospel alive. Since the beginning of human time there has been war, there has been violence and hatred, and the absence of universal love has been the darkest cloud of our existence. Since the very beginning God has been calling us to love, and humanity has been rebelling against it. Certainly, when we look at the world we live in currently, there is an absence of good will and a spirit of peace and reconciliation. When we narrow that window down to our own local situations, we also see evidence of that as well, and the question must always be what are we doing, and what can we do to make a difference? It's hard to make a positive difference when we don't even know the name of our next-door neighbour, where everyone keeps to themselves and has no interest in fostering

relationships. There was a time, especially for those of us who grew up in small communities, where we knew not only our neighbours but everyone in the community on a very personal basis, and where there were community efforts to take care of each other. Sadly, much of that has gone by the wayside, and society now lacks that spirit of care and compassion on a large scale. Though that may be the case, the reality is that God is calling us into relationships, and that in essence we are one human family living together, in the words of Eucharistic prayer number 4, on this fragile earth, our island home. Somehow or other we must break free from the notion that we don't have a duty to others, and that we can live in isolation from others. The most destructive thing during the pandemic on our overall well being, were the times when we were isolated from each other. The absence of people in our lives can be very difficult, because we are created to be in relationship and to be in community. When Jesus sent his followers into the world, he didn't send them alone, they were sent forth in pairs or small groups. When he called together his disciples, he called them together as a group of 12 and he prepared them to be the foundation of the church as a community of believers in relationship. We are, together, the body of Christ, and when one part of the body is injured, we all hurt, and when one rejoices, we all rejoice. When every part of the body is healthy and working well, much can be accomplished. The global pandemic did a lot of injury to the body of Christ, but thank God the body is healing and together we can be all that God wants us to be as the church.

Talk about mystery, this Sunday (June 4th) is known as *Trinity* Sunday in the life of the church. It begins the longest season of the church year. I have written before of the mystery of the Trinity, three persons in one God, and any explanation we give is couched in the inability of our human language to adequately describe it. Father + Son + Holy Spirit = one God. It is a deep mystery, but the words of Jesus, reinforces our theology behind it. The death of Jesus on the cross was far greater than the death of a martyr, and there were many early church martyrs. We believe that the love of God for us was so great that God came in human flesh and dwelt among us. What great love for us, undeserving as we are, but given freely by grace. We can never do enough to earn salvation, it is the free gift of God for all who will receive it - Amazing grace! Remember, God loves each of us, and all is asked is that we spread that love to others and change the world.

The Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre is now available for rentals. Because of costs, earlier this year Vestry made a slight increase to rental rates. It was a very minimal increase and the facility is still the least costly venue in the town.

All individuals, church and non-church groups are reminded that the Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre and washrooms are not to be accessed until the after-school Ballicatter group concludes at 6:00 pm Monday to Friday and all children are picked up. This is in accordance with provincial rules that govern the Ballicatter operation. If access to the kitchen is required, please check with Michelle first. Anyone using the facility during the time the program is operating must have a code of conduct letter on file at the parish office, as well as permission from Michelle, the Ballicatter program administer.

Please keep our building secure. We have had no recent security issues, but from time-to-time it is good for us to remind everyone entrusted with a key to the building that it is the responsibility of that person to safe guard the key, and to ensure the key is never given to any unauthorized person. Please ensure that all lights are turned out, garbage placed in the outside box, the door securely closed and locked. If a person receives a key for a specific duty and that person is no longer in that role the key must be returned so it can be given to the new person in that role.

Columbarium niches are still available for purchase. Approximately 34 of the 48 available have been sold since they were first installed in 2016. The cost is still \$3000 (no tax if purchased from the church, funeral home will charge tax) The plan is to install more of them once these are sold, however, the cost of future units will be determined by the cost of purchase and installation at that time. Anyone requiring more information about the columbarium is asked to speak to the rector.

This would involve about 4 hours per week of ensuring the foyer, Parish Centre, kitchen, washrooms and hallway are cleaned in preparation for Sunday worship. This person would begin on September 1st. Now that our choir is up and going again we would love to welcome new members of all ages. It would be wonderful if we could have enough members to fill out the choir pews on both sides of the chancel. In addition to singing to the glory of God on Sunday morning it is also a time of fellowship and fun each week at practice.

We will be re-shingling the church roof soon. In the past year we have noticed that each time we have strong wind we lose a few shingles. We have determined that the life of the shingles have now expired and the problem will only get worst over the near future. We also want to avoid the damage that comes from water leaking through the roof. We were hoping to do this work another year, especially doing the lighting project this year, however, it is necessary to get it done now. Vestry received a number of bids on the work, and they did range in price vastly; we decided to accept a bid from Metro Roofing of \$56,850.00 plus HST for a total of \$65,377.50 We will receive half the HST back (4,263.75) and we will receive a rebate from our diocesan account (2,500). Once we receive these rebates the cost of doing the roof will be approximately \$58,613.75. We ask all our parishioners to support the ongoing work of maintaining our building, by regularly contributing above and beyond our regular offerings, to the Maintenance Fund.

The lighting project will begin soon. Snow's Electrical will begin the work of replacing the lighting in the main part of the church in the very near future. If you would like to contribute to the cost of the lights that would be wonderful. Presently there are 57 lights hanging in that area. Going with new LED lighting we will have 36 lights at an average cost of \$1150 per light. A few people have expressed interest in donating a light in memory of loved ones, and we appreciate that very much.

A call for musical talent is going out to all our parishioners. As we all know, there are a lot of people in our congregation with gifts of music and/or song, which we would like to incorporate into our worship from time-to-time. Rev. Randy hopes to hold a Memorial Hymn-Sing in March, and draw on some of our parish talent to participate in addition to our choir. This service will be held on a Sunday evening on a specific date to be determined later. If you or anyone in your family would like to prepare a hymn(s) or gospel song(s) please speak to Rev. Randy. It is our hope to be able to occasionally do some services to involve members of the congregation in this way.

A message from our hospital chaplains – whenever you are admitted to one of our local hospitals, and would like to receive a visit from one of our Anglican chaplains, please register as "Anglican" and indicate at that time that you wish to see a chaplain during your stay. Unless you do this the chaplain may not know you are there.

More help is needed with the ACM recycling program. Did you know that over the many years our ACM has been collecting recyclables they have brought over \$250,000 into the parish? Each week the recyclables are picked up from designated drop off bins in town, taken to the sorting and counting location, and counted and bagged on Monday nights. Once there is enough collected, they are taken to the recycling depot in St. John's There is a need for more help in doing this work. If you would like to be part of this very important work, and can spare a couple of hours on Monday nights, please speak to Gary King or John Parrell. **Maintenance Fund**: We continue to ask our parishioners to give monthly through the Maintenance Fund to help us lower our debt on the heating system. We borrowed the amount of \$50,000.00 from the Bank of Montreal. This loan, we are happy to say will be completely paid off this coming November. We will need to keep paying into our maintenance fund on a regular basis, especially with two ongoing major projects this summer, the interior lighting and replacement of roof shingles; which means this year alone we will spend approximately \$100,000.00. Your ongoing support of the Maintenance Fund is extremely important to the parish.

2023 church envelopes are available. If you don't yet have yours, please check the table in the foyer. If you don't see them there, please speak to Rev. Randy and he will provide them to you. If you are new to our parish and would like to offer regular support, please ask for your box of envelopes as well.

Envelope drop-off box in the foyer. The box formerly used to collect Canadian Tire money, has now been repurposed to receive weekly envelopes. This box is accessible most days of the week (Monday – Friday) in the afternoons, when the main doors are open. If you have church envelopes to drop off to the church during the week, and the office is not open, please drop them into the box next to the nursery room door. This box will be checked at the end of each day and any envelopes inside will be transferred to the office safe until monies are counted on Sundays.
