As I gather my thoughts, and reflect upon them for this bulletin, I am thinking about "Thanksgiving", as we are in the Thanksgiving weekend. I suppose Thanksgiving means different things for different people. For some it is about the simple things of life, such as family, friends, food, good health, and warm homes to live in. For others it might be about an abundance of wealth and self-centered acquisitions that money can buy. When Thanksgiving becomes only about ourselves, and our self-gratifying appetites, then it goes against the very reason we have a Thanksgiving Day, and, the sincerity of our thankfulness may be somewhat questionable to say the least. Being a Christian and being thankful go hand-in-hand, for to be ungrateful strikes the very heart of Christian living in a very negative way. The German mystic Meister Eckhart is reputed to have said that "if the only prayer you make is "thank you," that will suffice. Thanksgiving is the virtue of interdependence, the recognition that our achievements are not fully our own, but emerge from a network of relationships that sustain and shape us, giving us the materials from which we create our experiences moment by moment. Thanksgiving as a spiritual practice reminds us that all our gifts are communal as well individual. Our creativity and freedom, our ability to choose the good and noble, have their origins in forces larger than ourselves -- God, this good earth, and persons who have guided, protected, inspired, and nurtured us. We have a responsibility to each other and we have a responsibility to God, for we all share this planet together, decisions we make will impact others in some way, because we live in community. Thanksgiving turns us from individualism to community and to wider and wider circles of care. It is important to remember that Paul's letters, such as Philippians, were written to communities and not just individuals. Paul is imagining God's harvest emerging from a small community of faith, in which each of the members matters for the well-being of the whole. In the spirit of Paul's description of the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12), the wellbeing of the whole and the well-being of the members are interconnected seamlessly. No one can be left behind, rejected, or neglected if the body is to remain healthy and whole. A major problem in our world today is that significant loss of corporate or communal care and responsibility, society dictates to us that we should ignore everyone else

and look out for our individual selves. Since the beginning of the pandemic nearly four years ago we have seen this societal attitude more than ever, it's perhaps one of the biggest reasons why poor and middle- class people are suffering so much with the increased cost of living affording food, mortgages or rent, and heating those places. During the pandemic, and in its aftermath, big business, such as grocery chains, oil companies, banks, and a host of others, have made profits that have never been seen before. They have been very quick to pass the costs onto the consumers in disproportionate ways, that burden ordinary people but make them very rich. As I was watching an American news station early this morning, they talked about some of those who are on the Forbes list of the richest people in the world. Top of that list was Elon Musk, the Tessla owner, and the guy who bought Twitter and renamed it "X", with a net worth of 251 billion dollars. To put that into perspective, the earth has a population of 8 billion people, Mr Musk could give every single person on the earth a little over \$31 each. Some will call this "success"; however, the true success of a person is not how much money they have, but what they are doing with it. The danger of this kind of extreme wealth is that the driving force in our lives becomes all about how much more I can get and not about how much more good I can do. When this happens it quickly goes from success to greed. It is a known fact that the earth provides way more than we need annually to feed the world's population. however, because of greed, the poor are starving in numbers that are staggering. We don't have a problem with the poor, we have a problem with greed.

What all of this boils down to for us, who seek to follow Christ, and live our lives as a reflection of his love to a very broken world, is how thankful are we? We hear over and over in Jesus' words that love, mercy, compassion and giving are always more important than amassing fortunes on earth. The sad reality is that life is temporal, in the space of eternity it seems like a flash and its over, and what we have gets left behind. In a spirit of thanksgiving for this new life Christ promises to us we go about in this life doing good wherever we can, spreading kindness, lifting up the downtrodden, being a voice for those who have no voice, and sharing with others what God has given us so richly. I hope everyone will have a wonderful Thanksgiving, and that all of us will take the time to reflect on our own individual lives and give God the thanks for who we are, where we are, and what we have. Thank you to Dr. Greg & Lisa Brown for sponsoring and hosting our first "Coffee Hour" last Sunday (Oct. 1st). It was a great success and we look forward to our next one on October 29th. This one will be sponsored and hosted by Ruth Hiscock and Dawn Cheeseman. We will have one every fourth Sunday. Thank you to all those who helped with the Sub Sandwich sale. As in the past, it was another great success for our ACW. Thank you to those who took the orders, helped cut the meats, and prepared the subs. A big thank you to those who supported this fund raiser by purchasing the sandwiches. **Children wanting to be part of the Christmas Pageant** this year at the 4:00 pm Christmas Eve service should be attending Sunday School. In the very near future, we will be assigning the various parts so that we can start rehearsing.

Sunday School. We are asking all parents who would like to enrol their children to please speak to Rev. Randy, Lori Gosse or Stephanie Smith. We also are in need of parents to volunteer to help out as well. We hope to get everything up and going soon so that we can begin planning our Christmas Eve pageant.

The lighting project is now completed. We are pleased to say that our church building is now very energy efficient. A few years ago we did all of the lighting in the parish hall, foyer, meeting rooms, bathrooms, offices and exterior with LED energy efficient lighting. The only place left was the main part of the church, the worship space. At a cost of approximately \$40,000 the lights in this space, has now been replaced with new lighting. Some of the lights have been donated (a few are still available to donate in full or in part), and we will place plaques on the fover boards recognizing these contributions. We are pleased to announce that we also received a federal government Community Service Recovery Fund grant in the amount of \$30,000 to be applied toward the cost of the new lighting, for which we are grateful. The contractor for this work was Snow's Electrical, and we are pleased with what they did.

The roof project is also completed. We are happy to report that we now have a brand new roof above us. After more than 20 years we realized that the old shingles were not going to last another year, and needed to be replaced. Our roof is both sloped and flat, the sloped roof has shingles and the flat sections (over the foyer & kitchen) have a torch-on membrane. At first we did not anticipate doing the flat sections this year, however, once we started the project, it was obvious that these areas too were is great need of replacement. It boosted the cost of the roof by another \$22,500 plus HST, for a total cost of just over \$91000.00 but it was really necessary. For the size of the roof, we believe as a Vestry, we got the very best price we could get for this work. It also included replacing a lot of rotten wood in the bell tower, and 4 days with a crane operator as two men worked on the tower suspended in a large bucket. The company that did this work was Metro Roofing, and they did perhaps even a little more than we would have expected them to do, such as the rot in the bell tower, without charging anything more.

We are inviting musical participation for the 4:00 pm Family Service on Christmas Eve. We really enjoy the talent shared with us by young people and families as they play and/or sing at the Christmas service. If you would like to play and/or sing at the service please let Rev. Randy know.

Ballicatter - We are pleased to report that they have a full program, with an extensive waiting list of children wanting to attend. This is great news for them and great news for our parish, as they are the main renter of the parish hall. This year, because of increased operating expenses, we had to increase their rent by \$250 making it \$2250 per month from September to June. They are very understanding of this and it is the first increase since they began using our space. As a reminder, because of government regulations under which they operate, we must ensure that when they are using the space, which includes the parish centre and washrooms, no other persons are allowed access. Their usual hours of operation are from 2:00 pm until 6:00 pm Monday to Friday.

Help needed in our Sound Room on Sunday mornings? There is a real need for volunteers to control the microphones, etc. during our morning services so that we have the right volume and everyone can hear what is being said. This would be a great thing for some of our young people to get involved with, they have lots of technical ability for sure. We would also like to get back to using our screens on a more regular basis as well. Speak to Rev. Randy about it.

Our parish received a \$30,000 grant from the federal government *Community Service Recovery Fund.* This money is granted specifically for the lighting project we just completed. This means that, with the donation of some of the lights, this project will end up costing the parish very little. We are very grateful for this grant, and want to especially thank our parish treasurer, Debbie, for all the work she put into submitting the application.

Columbarium niches are still available for purchase. Approximately 37 of the 48 available have been sold since they were first installed in 2016. The cost is still \$3000 (no tax if purchased from the church, funeral home will charge tax) The plan is to install more of them once these are sold, however, the cost of future units will be determined by the cost of purchase and installation at that time. Anyone requiring more information about the columbarium is asked to speak to the Rector.

Our Food Bank boxes are still in the foyer and we welcome donations of non-perishable food items to be dropped into them. Once they are full we take them to the Pop-Up Pantry (food bank) at St. Lawrence's church.

Parish Recycling program is something we are very proud of in our parish. This is a project taken on by our men's group (ACM) many years ago and still going strong. Residents of the town drop off their bottles and cans at several designated sites, our men pick it up and take it to the recycling trailer, where it gets sorted, counted and bagged every Monday night. Once we have enough its placed on a trailer and taken to the recycling depot in St. John's. In addition to keeping a lot of stuff out of the landfill, it brings much needed money into our parish budget. There is a need for extra volunteers that can spare about two hours on a Monday night (7-9 pm) to come along and help out. If you can do this, please speak to our ACM president, Gary King at 709-895-6239.

Maintenance Fund. The work we undertook this summer was possible because we had a very healthy maintenance fund, therefore, we did not need to borrow the money. Now that the work is done, we need to rebuild our fund again for future work that arises. We have been using the maintenance fund as well for the past 7 years to repay the loan we acquired to install the geo-thermal heating system. We are happy to say this will be paid off fully this coming November, for which we give thanks. We can't stress too much the importance of building up our maintenance fund, because it enables us to look after the physical structure of our building, so that necessary work gets done in a timely fashion because we have the money to do it. Please keep being generous with your contributions to our parish maintenance fund.
