A WARM WELCOME IS EXTENDED TO ALL OUR PARISHIONERS AND VISITORS WHO ARE WITH US TODAY. WE HOPE THAT GOD WILL BLESS US AS WE WORSHIP HIM HERE TOGETHER AT ST. PHILIP'S CHURCH.

From the Rector's desk: As we continue in the global chaos of Covid-19, I sense a tiredness in many of the people that are tasked with the job of having to appear on public media every day. Though we are really getting a handle on the virus in Canada, number of infections and deaths are dramatically down, and we are looking at jump-starting our economy again. For all of that we are still living with a sense of anxiety and dread, knowing that it wouldn't take much to stoke the flames of Covid-19. We are especially fearful because of what we see happening with our friends and neighbours in the USA. They have not yet found a way to slow down the spread of the virus, as a result many thousands are still being infected daily, and thousands are still dying weekly. Please continue to pray for them, and for their political leaders that have yet to find a way to cooperate and act together on what is a matter of life and death for their people.

This week we are able to take solace in some good news coming from Oxford University, as they reported some very promising signs of a potential vaccine on the horizon. Even with that as a hopeful possibility we are still some time away from a vaccine being available on a global scale, so we must still conduct our day-to-day lives with a heightened sense of caution and care. I talked of a sense of tiredness creeping into those who are on the frontlines of Covid-19, health professionals, political leaders and researchers. We must not confuse that with hopelessness, for a lot of good work is being done by so many and we are the beneficiaries of that. I suppose even if you look at the church, by this time there likely is a sense of tiredness as well. We have been nearly five months outside of our buildings, and many of the normal things we were used to doing, worship (especially Eucharist), meetings, ministry programs, fellowship dinners and fundraisers, etc. we have not been able to do. We try our best to find some sense of normalcy with parking lot services on Sunday morning, and Facebook postings, but it is not a perfect substitute for being together. I hear every day from parishioners that are so tired of not being able to sit in a pew on Sunday morning, and miss

together corporately and communally. For the Christian there is a deep need for community, we find our strength and faith in supporting and encouraging one another. I hope when we emerge from this barren time of a Pandemic we will all rekindle that flame that has perhaps been smouldering within us for the last few months. For now we may feel like the children of Israel wandering the desert following their captivity in Egypt, but let us remember they were there for 40 years before they found their way home, I hope we all have the spiritual stamina to get through this Pandemic, God willing it will be sooner rather than later. We are never without hope, by definition we are a people of hope because we are people of the Resurrection. God is able to reach into every situation of life, even when human beings lose hope, and bring about something wonderful and powerful. I'm positive God's hand is at work in our lives and in our world during this difficult time. I love the story in Ezekiel Chapter 37, that details a vision by the prophet depicted in a dream. Ezekiel is in a valley full of dry human bones. He is commanded to carry a prophecy. Right before his very eyes the bones connect into human figures, then they are covered with tendon tissues, flesh and skin. Then God reveals the bones to the prophet as the people of Israel in exile and commands him to carry another prophecy in order to revitalize these human figures, to resurrect them and to bring them to the land of Israel. So, we see the power of God to bring hope where there is doubt and fear, light where there is darkness, and life from death. So my friends if you are feeling a little bit fatigued at this point, don't lose hope or courage, good things are happening around us, and I feel that by God's grace we will soon emerge from this valley we have been in for so long now. In the past month I have had the privilege of doing two baptisms and a wedding at St. Philip's church. As long as we respect the rule of no more than 50 people and physically distance, and clean up after, we can do weddings and baptisms inside. Deacon Bonnell had the honor a few weeks ago to baptize their first grandchild, what a joyous event in their family life. So, we are moving in the right direction, good things are happening, and we want each of you to continue to pray for one another, for the parish, the clergy, our bishop and diocese. Please maintain your regular financial support as well; our level of givings have decreased with the building

We received a grant from the Anglican Foundation to help with the plans we have for the cemetery space around the columbaria. Given the difficult year it is shaping up to be for investments we are very fortunate and grateful to receive this grant of \$2500. When we start and complete these beautifications will depend on the lifting of restrictions around Covid-19. Our parish supports the work of the Anglican Foundation, and, our own Debbie Collis is a member of the Foundation.

The past several Sundays Rev. Randy has conducted church services from the church entrance, with parishioners listening from their vehicles. If weather permits we will continue do so, however, we must insist that everyone continue to maintain the principle of physical distancing by remaining in the vehicle at all times.

Cemetery Services in our diocese have been put on hold this Summer until such a time as congregations are able to meet together. Ours was scheduled for July 26th but as of now, the service will not proceed at that time. Please do maintain the graves of your loved ones as you exercise physical distancing.

Many are inquiring about this year's Flower service. It was originally scheduled for July 26th, however, our bishop sent out a directive to all parishes in the diocese stating that there would be no gatherings of people in any of our cemeteries this year. Right now we don't know when it will be, with a bit of good luck and things are looking better in September maybe then.

Our parish task force is in place to work toward the reopening of our church building. We are gathering necessary items such as; hand sanitizer, disinfectants, masks, cleaners, etc. We must ensure all the protocols are addressed before we can reopen. We want to take every care to make sure that as we open again we will do so safely and not put any of our parishioners at risk.

Let's call one another –we are probably home! Many of us are missing those we are so used to seeing on Sunday morning in church. Why not pick up the phone and give them a call, no doubt it will make their day and reassure them that they are not forgotten. This is a real ministry of the church in which we can all engage.

What is the status of parish hall rentals? At this time The Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre is not available for any rentals. In September we will make the hall available to our major renters, The Ballicatters and Eastern Health group, as long as they have documentation from Eastern Health showing their start up plan. Even this will need diocesan permission.
