From the Rector's desk:

Today is the beginning of Holy Week, and, from now until next Sunday we will experience the heartache of seeing our Lord betrayed, arrested, placed on trial, mocked, physically tortured and, finally, crucified horrendously on a cross. It all begins today, as Jesus rides into Jerusalem, where he is welcomed and celebrated as a king. The Jewish people had long awaited a Messiah, a warrior king who would lead them into victorious battle over the Roman oppressors, thus freeing them from many years of oppressive domination. So, the people lined the streets of Jerusalem shouting *Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest*. They waved their Palm branches, they placed their garments on the ground so that Jesus could parade in and not get dirty and dusty. Their first clue that Jesus was not the kind of king they were looking for should have been the donkey he was riding upon. A donkey, a symbol of humility and passivity, was the opposite of a mighty strong horse that can be aggressive and always ready for battle. It didn't take long before the people would realize that this man, Jesus, was not the one they were waiting for. Jesus would talk about love, forgiveness, turning the other cheek, so, within a couple of days those same people would be shouting out – *Crucify him, Crucify him*. I suppose, given their disappointment, it may have been a natural human response, all they could see now was a certain future of hardship under Roman rule, their hopes for freedom were dashed. We have never lived under an oppressive government where our rights and freedoms are restricted and violated, and any form of protest from us is met with physical punishment, prison or even death. Perhaps most of us would be disappointed to given the hardship of

life. They could not see at that point that Jesus was indeed a king, the greatest king that ever lived, and that his kingdom encompassed both heaven and earth. Though his birth was in a lowly stable, born of poor earthly parents, lived a simple life, and often had nowhere to lay his head, had no luxuries afforded to him, he would be the most majestic king to ever live. Jesus, at his arrest and trial, makes it very clear that his Kingdom is not of this world. His Kingdom is a heavenly one, his servants are you and I, and everyone on earth that bows their knee to him and professes him as Lord and Saviour. You and I have the benefit of knowing how the story ends, but the people of that first Palm Sunday, had no way of knowing what was about to unfold before them, and so we can't be too critical of them. Perhaps there have been times in our own lives when we have praised the name of Jesus, only later to angrily take that same name in vain. Jesus harbored no ill will toward them, his love extended to them even as they shouted for his crucifixion, and he asked God to forgive them all, even his executioners. Many of them in the days after his death, resurrection and ascension would become believers and servants, and tireless labourers in the vineyard of service, people like Saul, the greatest persecutor of Jesus and his followers, who, after his conversion would be known as Paul. The drama that started then is still ongoing, the last word is still unspoken, and you and I are not merely spectators watching from the sidelines of history, we are part of the ongoing events of Christianity that started then and is still being worked out. Join us this week as we go from the glory of the palms to the glory of the Resurrection.

- **The bishops have now been nominated for the office of Primate.** This coming July, at the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Canada, our current Primate, Archbishop Fred Hiltz, after 12 years, will retire and a new primate will be elected on the last day of the Synod. The bishops of the country met this past week at Niagara Falls, and part of their agenda included nominating the bishops that will stand for election for Primate. Even though the bishops put forth the nominations, they will not have a vote at the General Synod, the new Primate will be elected by the House of Laity and the House of Clergy only. It's important that we begin to pray now for the General Synod (July 10th – 16th in Vancouver), and for the bishops nominated for election as Primate. The following is the list of bishops up for election at that time (July 16th):
- The Right Reverend **Jane Alexander** of the diocese of Edmonton;
- The Most Reverend **Ron Cutler** of the diocese of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island and Metropolitan of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada;
- The Most Reverend **Gregory Kerr-Wilson** of the diocese of Calgary and Metropolitan of the Ecclesiastical Province of Rupert's Land;

- The Right Reverend **Linda Nicholls** of the diocese of Huron; and
- The Right Reverend **Michael Oulton** of the diocese of Ontario. Please keep them in your daily prayers, and may the work of the Holy Spirit be visible at the General Synod throughout their gathering.
