#### From the Rector:

By this time (June 14th) we are all so very tired of the cold, wet spring we have been enduring, and, longing for the warmth of sunny skies. As I write today the sun has finally appeared, however, by the time you read this you might wonder where it went again. I know how anxious everyone is to welcome summer weather, the kids are almost finished school, parents have scheduled holidays and all kinds of plans for summer - vacation, relaxation, travel, cottage retreat, backyard barbeques, and so much more. I hope we all get to do the things we have planned, and that, above all, everyone has a safe, healthy and happy summer. High school graduations are taking place as well, and, on behalf of St. Philip's parish, I extend congratulations and best wishes for continued success to all the young people of our parish that are graduating from grade 12 this year, and launching out into postsecondary institutions in September. The possibilities before you are numerous, embrace what is your passion and shoot for the stars, vou can achieve whatever is vour heart's desire.

As we go into summer, as is normal this time of year, parish activities slow down, groups within the church take a break from busy activities, and we move along at a slower pace. What does not change is our schedule of Sunday worship services, all through summer there will be worship at 8:30 am and 10:30 am every Sunday, and we look forward to welcoming our parishioners and visitors to share with us. When the pandemic was declared over 3 years ago, and churches had to close and adapt to a new way of worshipping, one of the changes was the removal of the Common Cup at Eucharist. As of Sunday, May 28th, parishes in this diocese are once more permitted to use the Common Cup, for those who are comfortable doing so. As the

Bishop's letter states, it is perfectly fine to continue to receive in one kind only (bread), the validity of the sacrament is not compromised, but if one desires to receive from the cup also, there is now provision for it once more. Many are familiar with the practice of "Intinction", the dipping of the communion wafer in the cup, for obvious reasons this practice has not been approved at this time. When you come to the communion rail to receive the consecrated bread, but do not wish to receive from the chalice, simply cross your arms so that the chalice bearer is aware. As we slowly get back to normalcy in a postpandemic world, we do so with care and caution.

One of the focuses of our parish over the past few years has been our responsibility to be good stewards of God's creation, reducing our carbon footprint, and ensure we are doing what we can to provide for future generations. We are doing a number of things in our parish life that reflect this emphasis. For many years our men's group (ACM) have been involved heavily in a recycling program on a weekly basis, picking up recyclables from designated community drop-off sites, sorting, bagging and taking to the depot. In addition to the environmental benefits of recycling, it has, over 20+ years brought in many thousands of dollars to the parish budget. Our group can use extra volunteers if anyone would like to help. This is a wonderful thing we do here.

About 7 years ago the parish moved away from oil as a primary source of heat in our church building, and installed a geo-thermal system. Geothermal heating works by harnessing the heat energy just feet below the earth's surface and converting it into warm air through the use of geothermal heat pumps. This is both cost effective for the parish and much more environmentally friendly for the planet. Currently we are in the process of removing the lighting we have in the main part of the building (the worship area), and replacing it with new, more energy efficient LED lighting. This project will cost close to \$40,000 but going forward we will have better lighting, and, over the course of time realize some electrical savings. The contractor has the lighting materials and expects to start in the next couple of weeks. Again, we are moving into a system of lighting that is both environmentally friendlier and less expensive to operate. When this project is complete our building will be completely refit with LED lighting.

In addition to the lighting project, though we had not initially planned to do so this year, we discovered that our church needed to have the roof completely re-shingled. High winds were starting to blow off shingles, which, if not quickly remedied, would lead to even more damage, both outside and inside. Tenders were called, and the one accepted was the lowest by a very wide margin. The company selected is Metro Roofing, a local company. Some members of vestry have used this company and very satisfied with the quality of work done. This work will cost approximately \$65,000.00 (Tax included). which is nearly \$40,000.00 less than the next tender. The work being done and the type of shingles used, with the warranty, is the same as that of the competing bids. Approval has been received from our Synod Office for both projects, and they will be completed in the very near future. As you can see, combined they will cost approximately \$105,000.00 (we will receive back half of the hst cost) A few people have indicated that they would like to cover the cost of a light, this is great and will reduce the parish cost. If you would like to consider this, each light will cost about \$1150 to complete, and can be a memorial contribution. God is good, and we are thankful that these projects are being done without incurring the cost of borrowing. Through the generosity of our parishioners over the years, and our care in spending the funds, we are able to get this work done from what we have on hand. As the building ages it is critical for us to keep up on our maintenance, and do repairs and upgrades on a regular basis. Thank you for all your financial support to the parish, and we encourage our parishioners to continue to be generous to your church, so that we can continue to be a strong and viable parish for many years to come. We are grateful that we are in a position to do these major projects at this time when many parishes are struggling just to stay open. We rejoice that we are blessed, and when we work together, worship together, are faithful together, and take pride in our church, God will continue to bless us in all kinds of ways. Have a great summer. join us for worship, and remember the needs of the parish over the next few months. Blessings.

Because of costs, earlier this year Vestry made a slight increase to rental rates. It was a very minimal increase and the facility is still the least costly venue in the town.

All individuals, church and non-church groups are reminded that the Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre and washrooms are not to be accessed until the afterschool Ballicatter group concludes at 6:00 pm Monday to Friday and all children are picked up. This is in accordance with provincial rules that govern the Ballicatter operation. If access to the kitchen is required, please check with Michelle first. Anyone using the facility during the time the program is operating must have a code of conduct letter on file at the parish office, as well as permission from Michelle, the Ballicatter program administer.

Please keep our building secure. We have had no recent security issues, but from time-to-time it is good for us to remind everyone entrusted with a key to the building that it is the responsibility of that person to safe guard the key, and to ensure the key is never given to any unauthorized person. Please ensure that all lights are turned out, garbage placed in the outside box, the door securely closed and locked. If a person receives a key for a specific duty and that person is no longer in that role the key must be returned so it can be given to the new person in that role.

**Columbarium niches** are still available for purchase. Approximately 36895895898 of the 48 available have been sold since they were first installed in 2016. The cost is still \$3000 (no tax if purchased from the church, funeral home will charge tax) The plan is to install more of them once these are sold, however, the cost of future units will be determined by the cost of purchase and installation at that time. Anyone requiring more information about the columbarium is asked to speak to the rector.



The work of replacing church lighting and re-shingling of the roof will start very soon. As these jobs are underway, we may experience some inconvenience, however, we look forward to their completion. Rev. Randy speaks more about them in his reflection in this week's bulletin.

The summer season is upon us, we pray everyone will be safe and enjoy the next couple of months of holidays, vacation and recreation. Congratulations to students on the completion of another year of school, and best wishes to those who have graduated grade 12 and going into post-secondary education and careers.

Church bulletins for the months of July and August will be printed once a month. Most parish activities slow down or halt for the summer months until September, therefore, there is not a lot of items to print. Rev. Randy will forward through email any information that needs to go out in between bulletins. If you would like to receive these emails from the parish, and the rector doesn't currently have your email address, please pass it along to him and he will add it to the parish email data base.

There are a couple of photo albums in the foyer containing photos of the CEW-ACW 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2008. Please have a look at them, maybe you are in them?

The lighting project will begin soon. Snow's Electrical will begin the work of replacing the lighting in the main part of the church in the very near future. If you would like to contribute to the cost of the lights that would be wonderful. Presently there are 57 lights hanging in that area. Going with new LED lighting we will have 36 lights at an average cost of \$1150 per light. A few people have expressed interest in donating a light in memory of loved ones, and we appreciate that very much.

A call for musical talent is going out to all our parishioners. As we all know, there are a lot of people in our congregation with gifts of music and/or song, which we would like to incorporate into our worship from time-to-time. Rev. Randy hopes to hold a Memorial Hymn-Sing in March, and draw on some of our parish talent to participate in addition to our choir. This service will be held on a Sunday evening on a specific date to be determined later. If you or anyone in your family would like to prepare a hymn(s) or gospel song(s) please speak to Rev. Randy. It is our hope to be able to occasionally do some services to involve members of the congregation in this way.

A message from our hospital chaplains — whenever you are admitted to one of our local hospitals, and would like to receive a visit from one of our Anglican chaplains, please register as "Anglican" and indicate at that time that you wish to see a chaplain during your stay. Unless you do this the chaplain may not know you are there.

More help is needed with the ACM recycling program. Did you know that over the many years our ACM has

bid you know that over the many years our ACM has been collecting recyclables they have brought over \$250,000 into the parish? Each week the recyclables are picked up from designated drop off bins in town, taken to the sorting and counting location, and counted and bagged on Monday nights. Once there is enough collected, they are taken to the recycling depot in St. John's There is a need for more help in doing this work. If you would like to be part of this very important work, and can spare a couple of hours on Monday nights, please speak to Gary King or John Parrell.

Maintenance Fund: We continue to ask our parishioners to give monthly through the Maintenance Fund to help us lower our debt on the heating system. We borrowed the amount of \$50,000.00 from the Bank of Montreal. This loan, we are happy to say will be completely paid off this coming November. We will need to keep paying into our maintenance fund on a regular basis, especially with two ongoing major projects this summer, the interior lighting and replacement of roof shingles; which means this year alone we will spend approximately \$100,000.00. Your ongoing support of the Maintenance Fund is extremely important to the parish.

**2023 church envelopes are available.** If you don't yet have yours, please check the table in the foyer. If you don't see them there, please speak to Rev. Randy and he will provide them to you. If you are new to our parish and would like to offer regular support, please ask for your box of envelopes as well..

Envelope drop-off box in the foyer. The box formerly used to collect Canadian Tire money, has now been repurposed to receive weekly envelopes. This box is accessible most days of the week (Monday – Friday) in the afternoons, when the main doors are open. If you have church envelopes to drop off to the church during the week, and the office is not open, please drop them into the box next to the nursery room door. This box will be checked at the end of each day and any envelopes inside will be transferred to the office safe until monies are counted on Sundays.


