From the Rector: : We are now in the middle of Easter week. a somewhat slower pace in the life of the church, after a very busy Holy Week and Easter Sunday schedule. I hope that Easter brought about a renewal of your faith, as it is the very foundation of our Christian hope and faith. For those who have school-age children, who are now enjoying this Easter break from school, I pray you are having a wonderful week of family time, traveling and sharing adventure together. We realize the speed of time as it goes by, and the way our children grow up so quickly. It seems just a short time ago our boys were just small children, and we never envisioned just how quick they would grow into adults, and we miss the things we did together as a family now as we reflect back. One of our great joys around this time of the year was school basketball tournaments, whether we hosted them in Grand Falls Windsor, or we took the boys on road trips to other towns around the province to play. All three of them played the sport all the way through school until they graduated, so there were many games over the years. It was always very exciting adventures. Now they have grown into young men, pursuing their own dreams and ambitions that point them in various directions. Even though two of them are still living at home with us, attending university, most places we travel to these days it's just the two of us. We miss the adventures of climbing in the car and going places and doing things as a family, so I hope you are having a wonderful time together with your family, and making memories that will last a life-time.

We had a very busy time in the parish over Lent, Holy Week and Easter. All through Lent (5 weeks) we met for worship every Wednesday evening, using a Lenten program titled -The Parables of Lent. Each week we focused on one of Jesus' parables, and how we connect with that parable in our own day and age. Over 2000 years later, we believe that the words Jesus spoke then are eternal and life-giving now. Lent is our time to focus our minds, hearts and spirits on preparing for Easter. I realize that, for many people, Easter is just a time for relaxation, holidays, and family gatherings, much the same as Christmas. While these things are important, and we should do them, Easter is about much more than that, and if we don't participate in the story of Lent, Holy Week (Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, his betraval, arrest and cruel crucifixion), and celebrate his resurrection on Easter Sunday, than we have missed the essence of Easter. As we continue to emerge from a three- year pandemic, it was refreshing to see good numbers of people worshipping all through Lent, all through Holy Week, and at the three Easter Sunday services. It was a good indication that our parishioners (and some visitors) are feeling the need to get back to church

fellowship and worship. Christians, by our very nature, are all about being together as a family of God, and finding strength in our faith relationships. It was a joy as well to be able to bring the children to the chancel step on Easter Sunday morning and talk to them about the meaning of Easter, for three years we have missed doing that.

For the next 7 Sundays (April 16th – May 21st) we are in the 40- day Easter Season, focusing our worship around the resurrected Jesus, and his various encounters with his disciples, and others such as Mary Magdalene, his encounter with those on the road to Emmaus (he shared a meal with them and they recognized him in the breaking of bread). It is not enough that he has risen, he now needs to show them that he is truly resurrected, and not a ghost. After 40 days (same amount of days he spent in the wilderness), he ascends into heaven, and, just as he promised he sends them the Comforter, the Holy Spirit, to lead them and to teach them all truth. Even after his resurrection, Jesus still needs to convince them that he is alive. Fast forward 2000+ years, and people still need to be convinced that Jesus is alive, even some who profess or once did to be Christians. The challenge of convincing others that Jesus is alive is not easy, and all we have is our own faith and convictions to do so. People will never be forced or argued into the faith, but oftentimes they can be loved into it. That is the key to success in any church, love is the essential ingredient of Christian living. We can have all kinds of programs, we can put off dramatic worship performances, but unless people feel loved and welcomed it will not succeed in adding others to the Kingdom of God. The word "love" is spoken hundreds of times by Jesus in scripture, and he says that others will know us by our love. Presumably the opposite is also true, that others will know us by our inability or unwillingness to love. I hope that whenever others come among us in the fellowship and worship of the church, they will know they are loved by us, and by Jesus Christ.

Now that we are past Easter Sunday, we always are aware that we are never past Easter. We are people of the resurrection, and every single Sunday service is a celebration of Easter. Every time we break bread together, I hope *Jesus is also known to us in the breaking of bread.* I invite you to join us each Sunday in worship together as the family of God right here at St. Philip's. Our Sunday School in back again, so please come and bring the children as well. May you have a blessed Easter, and a warm welcome awaits you. Blessings.

Now that our choir is up and going again we would love to welcome new members of all ages. Sunday School is up and going and we encourage parents with young children to bring them to the 10:30 am Sunday service so they can be a part of it. If we have adequate numbers of children we can plan some congregational activities as well. We also encourage others to volunteer as helpers.

Columbarium niches are still available for purchase. Approximately 31 of the 48 available have been sold since they were first installed in 2016. The cost is still \$3000 (no tax if purchased from the church, funeral home will charge tax) The plan is to install more of them once these are sold, however, the cost of future units will be determined by the cost of purchase and installation at that time. Anyone requiring more information about the columbarium is asked to speak to the rector.

As we draw closer to Summer, and as our parishioners think about travel, spending time away at the cottage, etc. please know that we appreciate it when we can keep up with our monthly financial commitments as a parish, which takes the pressure off our parish treasurer. We encourage the use of post-dated contributions, and especially signing up for E-Giving. Quite a few of our parishioners are already giving regularly electronically, if this is something you would like to do, please pick up the proper form from the parish office. We are also set-up for E-Transfer giving by using the parish email: stphilipsanglicanchurch@nf.aibn.com Regular contributions throughout the Summer really helps us stay on top of our bills, stipend, synod office assessment, etc. and makes it easier when things start up again in September. A call for musical talent is going out to all our parishioners. As we all know, there are a lot of people in our congregation with gifts of music and/or song, which we would like to incorporate into our worship from time-to-time. Rev. Randy hopes to hold a Memorial Hymn-Sing in March, and draw on some of our parish talent to participate in addition to our choir. This service will be held on a Sunday evening on a specific date to be determined later. If you or anyone in your family would like to prepare a hymn(s) or gospel song(s) please speak to Rev. Randy. It is our hope to be able to occasionally do some services to involve members of the congregation in this way.

Maintenance Fund: We continue to ask our parishioners to give monthly through the Maintenance Fund to help us lower our debt on the heating system. We borrowed the amount of \$50,000.00 from the Bank of Montreal. This loan, we are happy to say will be completely paid off this coming November. Following that we will need to keep paying into our maintenance fund on a regular basis because within the next couple of years we will probably need to replace the roof shingles, among other necessary jobs to be done. Your support of the Maintenance Fund is extremely important to the parish.

The 2023 Annual Flower Service will be on Sunday, July 23rd at 3:00 pm. We want to give everyone lots of advance notice, as some people living away may schedule their visit home around the time of the service.

All individuals, church and non-church groups are reminded that the Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre and washrooms are not to be accessed until the after-school Ballicatter group concludes at 6:00 pm Monday to Friday and all children are picked up. This is in accordance with provincial rules that govern the Ballicatter operation. If access to the kitchen is required, please check with Michelle first. Anyone using the facility during the time the program is operating must have a code of conduct letter on file at the parish office, as well as permission from Michelle, the Ballicatter program administer.

Bishop has authorized the return of the Common Cup. For three years we have been receiving Eucharist in one kind only (bread), because of safety concerns during the pandemic. As of Sunday, May 28th (Pentecost Sunday), parishes in the diocese, including here at St. Philip's, will once more provide the chalice for those who wish to receive from it. This comes from medical reassurance that it is once more, safe to do so. However, we realize that many people will still be uncomfortable receiving from the cup, and that is perfectly fine, and to continue to receive the bread only is also fine. Prior to the pandemic some people received the wine through intinction (dipping the bread in the wine), the bishop has advised that this practice is not to be used in the diocese, because of a greater concern of fingers inadvertently coming into contact with the wine. So, as of May 28th, we can do a couple of things: (1) Receive the bread and drink from the chalice or (2) continue to receive in one kind only (bread). The choice is entirely yours and the validity of the sacrament is real for each one.
