**From the Rector:**

Greetings from the parish of St. Philip's! As I write today, we are approaching Thanksgiving weekend, and, of course Thanksgiving Day on Monday, October 10<sup>th</sup>. Our American neighbours will celebrate theirs on the fourth Thursday of November. Though the dates are different, we celebrate for all the same reasons, we are nations that are grateful to God for prosperity and success. Thanksgiving weekend. For many, this long weekend really kicks off the autumn season. People across the country will spend it raking leaves, harvesting, shutting down the family cabin, and hopefully eating a delicious meal surrounded by friends and family. But where did this tradition come from? In 1621, the pilgrims at Plymouth Plantation, Massachusetts, held the first Thanksgiving in North America, giving thanks for the end to a drought and a bountiful harvest. Without the help of the Wampanoag (Native Americans), who shared planting, hunting, and fishing knowledge and techniques, the pilgrims would have died. Some records say the first official Thanksgiving likely predates this event by around fourteen years.

Believe it or not, Thanksgiving in Canada, or at least the land that would become Canada, has its own history, separate from our American counterparts. Traditions of giving thanks long predate the arrival of European settlers in North America. First Nations across Turtle Island have traditions of thanksgiving for surviving winter and for receiving crops and game as a reward for their hard work. These traditions may include feasting, prayer, dance, and other ceremonies, depending on the people's giving thanks. When it comes to European thanksgivings in Canada, we have a few tales to tell. As the story goes, in 1578, English explorer Martin Frobisher and his crew gave thanks and communion was observed, either on land at Frobisher Bay, in present day Nunavut, or onboard a ship anchored there. The explorers dined on salt beef, biscuits, and mushy peas and gave thanks through Communion for their safe arrival in then New-found-land. This is now accepted as the first "Canadian" Thanksgiving, forty-three years before the first "American" Thanksgiving. Forty-eight years later on November 14, 1606, inhabitants of New France under Samuel de Champlain held huge feasts of thanksgiving between local Mi'kmaq and the French. Though not known at the time by the settlers, cranberries, rich in vitamin C, are credited with helping avoid scurvy. The neighbouring Mi'kmaq likely introduced the French to cranberries, or as they called them, *petites pommes rouges* (little red apples).

However, despite this history of uniquely Canadian thanksgivings, our modern concepts of Thanksgiving were influenced by our American neighbours. Foods that are associated with a "traditional" Thanksgiving, such as North American turkey, squash, and pumpkin, were introduced to citizens of Halifax in the 1750s by the United Empire Loyalists, who continued to spread this "traditional" fare to other parts of the country. Today Canadian Thanksgiving is held on the second Monday of October every year, or at least it has been since Canadian Parliament declared it so on January 31, 1957. Before this, Thanksgiving in Canada had been held sporadically, often coinciding with other major events and anniversaries. In 1879, Thanksgiving was officially declared a national holiday to be held on November 6<sup>th</sup>. The date change to the second Monday in October was largely a result of the first and second world wars, which we officially remember each year on November 11, Remembrance Day. This was so that the two holidays would not fall on the same weekend.

These are just some of the facts of how Thanksgiving came to be the holiday it is in Canada. The important thing for us, as we approach this annual celebration is – in what ways do we express our gratitude to God for the blessings we enjoy in this great nation, and what exactly are we thankful for? That may be different for all of us, however, we all express thankfulness for certain things in our lives that we have in common such as – our family, our homes, our friends, our faith, the freedom to be who we are and to live in a free and democratic society, health and strength that enables us to work and provide for our families, and the list goes on and on. Whatever it is that you are thankful for, be sure to express that in thanksgiving to God for your many blessings. We live in a world where God gets less and less thanks as time goes on, yet, for us who live our lives in faith, we acknowledge that God is the source of all goodness and blessings. So, on this Thanksgiving Sunday, maybe everyone can find time to gather the family and attend worship, either in our home church or a church in some other place we happen to be visiting. Every Sunday, as we gather for Eucharist, we participate in the greatest expression of thanksgiving of all, as we acknowledge our dependence on God, and our expression of gratitude for God's many blessings. Happy thanksgiving to you and your family, from me and my family, and from your parish of St. Philip. Blessings to you all.

**Help at recycling is needed.** For many years now our men's group (ACM) has been involved in a parish recycling program. We have a trailer where recyclables are carried after they have been picked up from various locations, and a group of parishioners gather most Monday nights to sort and bag them. When enough has been collected then they are taken to the depot and turned into cash that mainly ends up in the parish budget each year. The pandemic has really hampered this work, and some of our men have not been able to get back at it yet. The other reality is that some of our helpers are not as young as they once were when the program was started. We really do need to have extra help on Monday nights in order to be able to continue this vital work, which is a service to our environment and a bonus to our budget. Seven or eight thousand dollars each year comes from this program. If you have time to help out some Monday nights please let our ACM group know or speak to the rector.

**The Canon EB Cheeseman Parish Centre is now available for rentals.** If you would like to book the hall, or would like information about rental costs, please contact Donna or Janice Spurrell at 895-3581. Because of costs, earlier this year Vestry made a slight increase to rental rates. It was a very minimal increase and the facility is still the least costly venue in the town.

In a time where diocesan and parish resources are extremely limited, and some parishes face a very uncertain future, we pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit, as we find ways to carry out ministry and mission in very challenging times.

**ACW & ACM are also starting up again** after a summer recess. These two groups are absolutely important to the life of our parish, in both the fellowship they offer, and, the much needed income they generate to the parish budget. They both work so hard and accomplish so much, and would love to see more attending their meetings and fellowship. Gary King is president of the ACM (Men's group) and Betty Lewis is president of the ACW (Women's group). Please give them your full support in the coming year.
