*Message from the Rector*

Greetings friends: It is hard to believe we have surpassed the first month of the new year, seems like such a short time ago we were celebrating Christmas and about to welcome a new year. Time gets away from us when we become distracted, and we have been distracted in January with cold, high winds and snowy weather. We are now entering into February, a shorter month, so we shall see what it brings in the form of weather. One thing we do know is that before we know it winter will be loosening its grip, and signs of spring will present itself, or at least we hope so. Now that we are into February, we might realize that, though Christmas was seemingly only a few days ago, we are now about to enter into the season of Lent. It all begins on Shrove Tuesday (February 17<sup>th</sup>) as we come together for our sausages and pancakes. Shrove Tuesday is the day before Lent starts on Ash Wednesday. The name Shrove comes from the old middle English word '*Shriven*' meaning to confess and to say sorry for the wrong things we've done. Lent always starts on a Wednesday, so people went to confess on the day before. This became known as Shriven Tuesday and then Shrove Tuesday. The other name for this day, Pancake Day, comes from the old English custom of using up all the fattening ingredients in the house before Lent, so that people were ready to fast during Lent. The fattening ingredients that most people had in their houses in those days were eggs and milk. A very simple recipe to use up these ingredients was to combine them with some flour and make pancakes! Shrove Tuesday is also an opportunity for the faith community to share together in a meal of celebration and fellowship before the more somber days of Lent begin. As the church, we still adhere to some of these customs of Lent, as lots of things ordinarily happening in the life of the parish

Is halted until after Lent, Holy Week and Easter day, especially fundraising activities. It really is about reflection and self-denial.

The 5 weeks of Lent and Holy Week are solemn times for us to remember and reflect on the life of Jesus, from his wilderness experience of fasting and being tempted by Satan, to his betrayal, arrest and crucifixion on Holy Thursday and Good Friday. It is only when we have a deep appreciation of the sacrifices that Jesus made for us that we can truly grasp the joy of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. Like the weeks of Lent and Holy Week are a journey to Easter, so too, our lives are a journey from life to death and new life. It begins with our birth and baptism into the family of God, we journey through life and at the sunset of our days comes death, but then the great joy of new and eternal life in the Kingdom of God. Our Lenten series this year will be *The Trials of Jesus*, where we will look at certain characters involved, such as Satan, Judas, Annas, Caiaphas, Peter and Herod. I invite you to join with us each Wednesday of Lent (starting Ash Wednesday) and make that journey together until we arrive at Easter Sunday, then join us in proclaiming the joy of the Resurrection, and claiming the hope we have in Jesus Christ – the resurrected Lord who loves us and claims us for his own. But, before we get to Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday, we have a couple more Sundays to consider Epiphany and Jesus' Transfiguration. Like our common lectionary indicates, we are moving through the events of Jesus' life piece by piece, his birth, life, death, resurrection and ascension. Much of this is mirrored in our own lives as well, for we are followers of Jesus on the same path. We have our own temptations, our own struggles of life, our own crosses to carry, as we follow in the footsteps of our master. May the upcoming journey of Lent be for us a time of reflection, renewal and spiritual growth.

**Columbarium niche sale update.** The new units were installed back in November, giving us an extra 48 niches, for a total number of 96 niches on site. To date, approximately 59 of those niches have been sold, with 37 remaining for sale. It is the parish intent to add additional ones once we get down to a certain number remaining, however, the purchase price of new ones will be determined by the cost of placing more columbarium units on site. For example, once we sold the first 48 niches at \$3000 each, the new units cost more to purchase, which meant we had to increase the niche sale price to \$4000 (no tax) We will continue to give updates as we go along.

**Fundraising will cease in Lent.** This means that for about 7 weeks we will depend on our envelope offerings (also E-Giving & EMT) only to meet the financial obligations of the parish. We ask our parishioners to be mindful of this and would really appreciate a special effort to get your offerings into the parish on a regular basis. Once we get past Easter Sunday (April 5<sup>th</sup>) we will resume our normal activities. Thank you for your faithful support of the parish.
